Three "Myths and Misconceptions" of Meaningful Engagement






Three "Myths" around Meaningful Engagement


- Myth 1: "Meaningful engagement" means having too many people at the table and can delay and complicate policymaking
- Response: Making policies without any people with lived experience can lead to less effective policies and lower uptake by the target population, resulting in poorer health outcomes. Nothing for us without us.





- Myth 2: Meaningful engagement will take too much time and resources
- **Response:** Meaningful engagement can actually be integrated into existing policies, programmes and practices. There are many ongoing and highpriority activities that can be efficiently enhanced through meaningful engagement.






Three "Myths" around Meaningful Engagement

- Myth 3: Including people with lived experience at the table can lead to very personal demands, rather than broader public health goals
- **Response:** Both individuals with lived experience and traditional decision-/policymakers need capacity-building to ensure that lived experience is treated as expertise and translated into effective policies and programmes. The Framework emphasizes this need for capacitybuilding on both sides for better communication and understanding.






Evidence on the value of meaningful engagement*

- Meaningful engagement of people living with HIV and AIDS has led to...
 - Better concordance with antiretroviral therapies
 - Longer survival
 - Better clinical outcomes
 - Better quality of life
 - Removal of stigma and discrimination in healthcare settings
- Meaningful engagement of young people and adults in addressing mental health conditions and substance use has led to...
 - Reduced hospital re-admissions
 - Improved adherence to treatment
 - Increased wellbeing and engagement of service users
 - Provided learning opportunities for health workforce

 - BMJ Collection on "Unleashing the power of lived experiences to accelerate action on 2. NCDs, mental health, and neurological conditions", led by lived experience authors
 - Develop an initial scoping paper on alternative models for participatory approaches, for 3. eventual operational toolkit or guide of Intention to Action materials
- **Opportunities for knowledge exchange via 2024 webinar series and shared** 4. learning on the Knowledge Action Portal





Next Steps – Regional & Country-Level Implementation

- **Pilot project for the implementation of the WHO Framework of Meaningful** 1. **Engagement for people living with cancer in the EMRO region**
 - Project across up to six Member States
 - Inclusive, participatory processes across lived experience communities
 - Pilot project will be: 1) Scoping review, stakeholder mapping, 2) Country multistakeholder dialogues, 3) Analysis of needs assessment with recommended actions for implementation of the Framework

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
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
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
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
